

# Who has a voice in Desegregation Funding and how these funds are used?

The Office for Civil Rights holds Flagstaff Unified School District responsible for high quality, research-based instruction for our students that has resulted in exemplary programs for English Language Learners, including Puente de Hózhó Magnet K-12 program and outstanding classroom services throughout the District. Supported by parents and citizens, the \$2.2M Desegregation Budget is part of Maintenance and Operations and goes through a public hearing prior to adoption by the Governing Board, who considers taxpayer input before approval.

In Fiscal Year 2015, 96% of former and current English Language Learners graduated from FUSD high schools.


## **How Desegregation Funds are Used**
