Knoles Elementary School has been transformed into a vibrant, welcoming space thanks to the incredible artistic talents of Mia Brokaw. As a parent and paraprofessional at Knoles, Mia has left an indelible mark on the school through her stunning murals, which adorn the hallways, office spaces, and common areas. Her attention to detail and passion for design have made the school a sight to see, drawing admiration and praise from students, staff, and visitors alike.

Mia's journey at Knoles began three years ago as a paraprofessional. A proud mother of four, with two of her children attending Knoles, she has always been deeply connected to the school community. But her true passion lies in art and design, and she has embraced the opportunity to bring her artistic vision to life on the school's walls.

Her first major project was repainting the "KIND" mural in the front lobby, a task she eagerly took on at the request of Principal Pete Galvan and Administrative Assistant Rosanna Lopez. Completing the mural just before the start of the school year, she realized how much of a difference art could make in creating an inviting and inspiring atmosphere. This led to a series of artistic projects completely transforming the school's environment.

She started with the art room entryway,

Mia finds great joy in seeing how students interact with her

artwork. Children pretend to smell the painted flowers, honk the fire truck's imaginary horn, and marvel at familiar characters like Stitch and Grogu in the toy store window. These playful moments enhance the school's atmosphere and foster

How FUSD is Responding:


Our top priority is to ensure a safe, inclusive, and supportive learning environment for all students. We are taking the following actions:

Empowering Families, Enhancing Learning: The Killip Academic Parent-Teacher Team

February 21, 2025

Empowering families and enhancing student learning is at the heart of the Academic Parent-Teacher Team (APTT) initiative at Killip Elementary School. This innovative approach transforms traditional parent-teacher conferences into engaging, datadriven conversations that extend learning beyond the classroom.

The APTT model is grounded in the idea that students thrive when families and teachers collaborate as true partners. In these meetings, classroom teachers share gradelevel priorities, review progress data, and discuss effective strategies that families can implement at home. The goal is to create a meaningful dialogue where both educators and families work together to support student success.

Killip Principal Joe Gutierrez recently shared insights about the program, noting that the first round of APTT meetings was held in October during parent-teacher conferences, with subsequent sessions on January 28 and 29.

"The Academic Parent Teacher Team meetings provide our classroom teachers and our families an opportunity to discuss what is being taught," he explained. "We compare data to determine how our students are doing, our students and parents have an opportunity to write a goal in ELA and Math, and at the end of the quarter the teacher and families check to see how much student achievement growth has been made. The teachers also share activities that can enhance student progress at home. This methodology is an example of Family Efficacy."

This comprehensive method informs families about classroom activities and equips them with practical tools to promote continuous academic improvement. The initiative includes annual individual sessions

where teachers meet with each family for a 30-minute personalized discussion, further deepening the partnership between home and school.

Killip Elementary School is proud to be part of this innovative approach that bridges the gap between educators and families. By working together, they are setting the stage for continued academic growth and a stronger, more engaged school community.





MEMS Students Transform Recycled Materials into a Vibrant Street Corner Art Display



At Mount Elden Middle School, art teacher Laura Abrams is leading a project that recycles iPad boxes to create a street corner art display. Her eighth-grade students have completed a project focusing on the work of local artist Chip Thomas.

Chip Thomas is a black artist who has worked as a physician on the Navajo reservation for his whole career. He began putting up murals all over northern Arizona, many of which show his perspective of the beauty of the Diné (Navajo) culture, as well as social issues that impact the community.

The eighth-grade students created a street corner out of boxes from the school's iPads and were then asked to use mixed media to create a social impact message of their own. The issues they chose to represent included topics such as immigration, water rights, women's rights, kindness, positivity, and environmental issues.

During Black History Month, sixth-grade students learned about David Driskell, and eighth-graders also learned about Lisa Whittington. These projects are currently on display in the library.

FUSD Celebrates National Board-Certified Teachers

February 21, 2025

The Flagstaff Unified School District (FUSD) is proud to recognize three outstanding educators for their achievements in the National Board Certification process. Jillian Hernandez has earned her first National Board Certification, while Sheryl Wells and Rachel Perugini have successfully recertified, demonstrating their continued dedication to excellence in teaching.

According to Yvonne Parent, a second-grade teacher at Knoles Elementary School, earning National Board Certification is a demanding three-year journey.

"Teachers must complete four components," she explains.

"Component 1 is a test, and Components 2, 3, and 4 are written. Each component requires teachers to reflect on different aspects of their practice based on National Teaching Standards and the five core propositions of what teachers should know and do," she said. "Only 4% of teachers are National Board Certified, and must recertify every five years."

For Rachel Perugini, a National Board-Certified Teacher at Flagstaff High School, the experience has been transformative.

"National Board Certification is the best professional development you can go through! It gave me the chance to push myself as a teacher and reflect on what I'm doing in the classroom and why I'm doing it," said Perugini. "My favorite part of this process is meeting accomplished teachers from around the state of Arizona. I am so proud of the other National Board teachers in Flagstaff this year, and I hope we continue to grow our NBCT numbers in FUSD. I look forward to working with new National Board candidates in the future."

Congratulations to Jillian Hernandez on her new certification and to Sheryl Wells and Rachel Perugini on their recertifications. Their achievements exemplify FUSD's commitment to fostering high-quality education and professional growth.

Kinsey Celebrates Success with Bridges Mathematics Curriculum

Kinsey Inquiry and Discovery School have proudly implemented the Bridges Mathematics Curriculum, yielding remarkable results in student proficiency, engagement, and overall classroom dynamics. Principal Ellen Herman shared insights into this structured, inquiry-based program's positive impact on their students and teachers alike.

"Implementing Bridges as our structured and inquiry-based mathematics curriculum has significantly enhanced students' mathematical proficiency and engagement," said Principal Herman. "We have had some positive outcomes from adopting the Bridges curriculum, which emphasizes handson, visual learning and encourages active student participation."

Herman explained that following the faithful implementation of Bridges, Kinsey has observed notable increases in test scores related to concepts and applications, including logic, reasoning, and problem-solving skills.

"The majority of students achieved proficiency in these areas, a success attributed to the curriculum's inquiry-based approach," she said.

Beyond the improvement in test scores, students have exhibited a significant enhancement in their mathematical vocabulary and their ability to articulate mathematical concepts. Classroom activities such as the Number Corner and various interactive workplaces offer students numerous opportunities to explore and discuss their learning in engaging and accessible ways.

"This approach has fostered a sense of agency and ownership over their educational journey," Principal Herman added.

Educators at Kinsey have noted transformative changes within their

classrooms. Cortney Peavy, a secondgrade teacher, enthusiastically shared her experience.

"I have been so amazed by how much one great program can change the entire way math is received in my classroom. Bridges has done just that. Bridges has allowed the students to see and try math in a very hands-on visual way. Every day I am preparing something new for the students to use to help them understand the math world around them," said Peavy, "The best thing about Bridges is that students see all types of math curriculum daily. In one day, the students will work with addition, subtraction, yards, inches, feet, and clocks. The students are constantly being exposed to math language that is, in most ways, kidfriendly. I have watched this program take all of my second graders to a new level in math. It is a lot of work on the teacher's end, but watching the students' excitement and the growth has all been worth it!"

Similarly, Ava Miller, a thirdgrade teacher, observed significant progress among her students.

"With the implementation of Bridges this year, students have made so much progress in their ability to talk about math, they have access to far more strategies to solve problems, and I have witnessed more student-identified success than ever before," said Miller. "My learners are able to feel successful no matter their academic background. I have students leading the 20-minute Number Corner each day, and it is such a joy to see them take pride and ownership of their learning."

These testimonials highlight the Bridges curriculum's transformative impact, fostering mathematical skill development, confidence, and enthusiasm for learning among Kinsey students.

Held at Flagstaff High School's Cromer Auditorium on February 1, 2025, the event showcased the dedication and hard work of students representing public, charter, private, and home schools in Coconino County.

Among the top finishers was Erin Ebers, a Mount Elden Middle School student who secured an impressive third-place finish. Erin's strong performance earned her a \$100 prize from Realty 85 Williams. She was among the outstanding finalists, including students from multiple

How to Prevent Norovirus Transmission

As Norovirus cases continue to rise across the United States, it is essential for FUSD families and staff to take precautions to prevent the spread of this highly contagious virus. Norovirus can cause symptoms such as vomiting and diarrhea and can affect individuals of all ages and health conditions. Currently, there is no vaccine available to prevent Norovirus, making preventive measures even more critical.

To help protect yourself and others, consider the following preventive steps: wash Hands Frequently—use soap and water to wash hands for at least 20 seconds. Hand sanitizer is not effective against Norovirus; avoid sharing food and drinks—this minimizes the risk of spreading the virus through contaminated surfaces or utensils; clean and sanitize surfaces—use soap and water for cleaning, followed by a 10% bleach solution to effectively disinfect surfaces; and stay home when sick. If you experience symptoms, avoid attending school or work until you are fully recovered to prevent spreading the virus to others.
